"Time flies when you are having fun"

The past twelve months have flown so the job as a Warden must be good!

The previous wardens at St Giles over their extended term, dealt with, amongst many other matters. two interregnums and Covid. Over the past twelve months since we took in the position as Wardens of St Giles our term seems to be panning out in a more practical nature.

We have encountered many challenges: 'Where are the hymn books, where is the collection plate, what is the format for a baptism, where to find the keys, what is a wand! (One function is to prod worshipers daring to fall asleep during the vicar's sermon. ('BE WARNED'). The deputy Wardens and members of St Giles have been very patient answering our 'never ending questions'. Suddenly we realised that although we were regular attendees, we generally had a lack of knowledge as to how St Giles works and also the number of volunteers who go quietly about their business keeping the church running.

To give a brief résumé, of what we have been up to, we have encountered, rats in the organ fan chamber, swarms of cluster flies in the tower, a broken fire alarm, defective emergency lights, bunches of homeless keys with no known lock, a leaking roof, being in attendance in the church to facilitate various workmen including organ tuners. Also, to facilitate funerals, weddings, baptisms etc, creating rotas and finally falling downspouts and subsequent roof damage, for which we have attended meetings with builders, scaffolders, insurance representatives. We could

probably fill several pages with jobs we have undertaken and jobs still ongoing.

We do have, on an almost a daily basis, various people who prefer the bohemian way of life. These visitors frequently create problems for us within our grounds, with tents and considerable amounts of rubbish, (human rubbish included), needles etc which we have to remove. Talking to people whilst engulfed in clouds of 'whacky backie', 'Hey Man!'. We do try to deal with this problem sensitively but sometimes we have to call upon the assistance of street ambassadors from BID and also the police for their specialist knowledge and help.

We have also taken on the responsibility for St Thomas' at Butterton. Much work has been carried out for example, clearing the drive and overhanging trees to make St Thomas more presentable and accessible. Our friends at Butterton will shortly have hot water which will make hosting their exciting forthcoming events easier, after all, washing up in cold water is not pleasant. They also had two downspouts which were blocked with various objects, one of which has now been cleared. The water previously held back was now free to flow soaking both Dennis and David upon its release to freedom. Hence, the remaining downpipe will wait until warmer weather before being cleared. Work is also in hand to repair the lead on the bell tower having being a victim of a strong westerly wind.

We would like to thank the committee at Butterton, for their hard work in promoting the church and also wish them all the best in their forthcoming events which will be advertised in this magazine during the year.

Working as a team is the only way to approach being a Warden, we both bring very different skills which 'compliment' each other and we also need to thank both Dennis' wife Marilyn and Gillian's husband David for their support.

Finally, we need to thank the congregation of St Giles who have supported us, answered our 'never ending' questions and embraced the changes we have made.






The Wind Doth Blow! - and causes problems!



Awinter storm brought very strong winds across the area at the end of January which caused part of the lead guttering downspout on the side of the tower (left white box) to become loose and fall to the ground. On it's way down, it broke several tiles on the main and side aisle roofs. The lead pipe landed by the porch, but a supporting bracket landed some way away at the edge of the car park.

Due to possible further dislodged items falling, the 'Right of way' through the churchyard and part of the car park were quickly closed off with barriers before a scaffolding tower was erected to inspect the damage.





Afine team of men from Atlas Scaffolding erected a magnificent scaffolding tower on the side of the ancient church tower, (see front cover), so that further investigations could take place for the insurance company to study the extent of the damage and the repairs required.

We have to thank our Wardens for all of their hard and speedy work regarding this difficult and on-going operation.

Off to the Peaks...

Forty six years in the meat trade and forty years in qualified nursing, combined:- for what? My husband had retired early and I was part time at a nursing residential home for the elderly, due to retire in the near future. So when the opportunity came up to buy piece of land in the Derbyshire Peak District, we could see no difficulties. We then bought 64 swaledale Ewes and two tups as we were told that sheep didn't need much looking after. How naive and green we were.....

We were greatly aware of the difficulties farmers have when illness strikes. The stock still have to be cared for, cows have to be milked twice a day. Animals have to be fed, watered and cleaned out, and new bedding supplied.

Time was speeding on, April was getting nearer and lambing. We made a safe area in the big barn in case the weather turns to blizzard conditions, at a high altitude at night this might strike at losses for lambing, and in this case it would be better if they were inside.


We would bring inside all the ewes expecting twins and triplets from 9.30pm to 8am this would prevent heartache for us, and the chance of a better survival of new born lambs.

This would be a last resort. The small barn was made

ready with individual pens made with metal hurdles 3ft by 6ft. New clean straw on the floor, rubber buckets tied in one corner for water, at the right height from the floor to enable the ewes to drink, but not low enough for the lambs to drown. Metal attachments on the tops of the hurdles to hold fresh hay and buckets for corn. Check the water supply, and disinfectant soap for hand, a good supply of old clean towelling, supplied over the years by friends and relatives. Sheets, flannelette are the best, torn into small sizes for drying hand, or warming up lambs, or cleaning down ewes. This supply of pieces of material has been invaluable over the years. We have no hot water supply on tap, and no electricity, only a small generator. So washing hands in cold water, (at times with a small covering of frozen ice) many times a day, it's essential to have them dried properly.

I never had chapped hands, and I'm sure this is due to drying them properly, not forgetting the large amounts of lanolin present in the ewes fleece. After using the towelling etc it's discarded and another piece used, no cross infection, and much better than paper towels. Very often we have arrived home, to find a parcel on the step, from some caller, hearing we are in need of more sheets and towels. People have been most helpful. This has been a huge - huge help. Aren't friends kind?

The second week of March finds us apprehensive if lambing should start now we are in danger of losses, too early for them to survive, the foetal lamb in the last

six weeks of pregnancy puts on 75% of weight, so if born early will be too small. This condition is abortive lamb disease, thankfully we never encountered this in our flock, but there are many more conditions which are present in the sheep, which we had to learn about.

In the later stages of pregnancy as the lambs develop in the ewe, the amount of space within the abdomen gets less, so the space for food within the rumen is limited, so a higher concentrate of food is necessary. A well know saying of farmers is, "if you have live stock, then you will have dead stock" the two go together. We struggle to come to terms with this, you have a ewe expecting triplets dead by a wall, or a dead lamb by a feeding crate, eyes pecked out by the crows, or a small malformed lamb, or a ewe dead by a water trough.

Very upsetting when you loose a lamb or ewe. Tom will very often weep over it, we feel we have failed, "Jesus wept" the shortest sentence in the bible, Jesus weeps and still weeps over us.

These deaths could have been due to lack of minerals, as I have mentioned before not all the ewes will use the lick mineral buckets, or come for corn. If we had been about within the final few hours of life minerals could have been administered by injection, depending on the symptoms, the ewes can look fine one minute and within a couple of hours be dead so soon.

The story of the yellow ribbons

We are loved with everlasting love! One of the greatest and most comforting doctrines taught in the Bible is the love of God for His people. In the Law and in the Prophets; in the poetical and historical books; in Gospels and Letters – all agree to tell us what God said to His people through Jeremiah. "I have loved you with an everlasting love" (Jeremiah 31:3).

It was that love that moved the Father to send His Son into the world (John 3:16). Paul writes glowingly of "that great love with which He loved us" (Ephesians 2:4). John emphasises the same great truth in a magnificent creed of just three words: 'God is love' (1 John 4:8). Quite simply there is nothing in all creation more reassuring, more comforting, more encouraging, more uplifting than to know that God loves us. And we can go further and put it in personal terms as Paul did. 'He loved me and gave Himself for me' (Galations 2:21).

How can we illustrate the illimitable love of God? One such illustration was told by the Rev John Wilbur Chapman of Indiana, an ordained Presbyterian minister who in 1893 went into full-time evangelistic ministry.

One evening Chapman was travelling by train in a rural part of Kansas. The other passenger in the carriage was a young man who kept glancing out the window and then covering his face with his hands. Chapman asked if he could help.

The young man confessed that many years before he had run away from home and 'sown his wild oats.' He had not written to his parents at all, until a few weeks before, telling them that he would be travelling on this train. At a certain point it passed very close

Saving St.Peters

ocal Residents are campaigning to save Saint Peter's Methodist Church and hall in Pilkington Avenue, Newcastle, after it was withdrawn from being sold at auction with a guide price of £455,000 on February 17th. They have managed to get the building registered as an 'asset of community interest'. The Methodist Church headquarters confirmed that it was withdrawn from the auction.

Members of the Westlands Hall Community Action Group successfully applied to Newcastle Borough Council to

to his home. In the letter he had begged his parents' forgiveness and asked if they wanted him to come home. If so, they were to tie a yellow ribbon on the old apple tree that grew right beside the railway lines.

"Sir," he said to Chapman, "the train will soon pass my home but I'm afraid to look. If there's a yellow ribbon on the tree, I'll get off at the next station and go home. If there's no ribbon, I'll just travel on. But I'm too afraid to look out for the tree." So Chapman offered to look for him.

"You can open your eyes now,' he said a few minutes later. The returning prodigal looked at Chapman with tears and quivering lips. 'All is well,' said the evangelist. 'There is a yellow ribbon on the apple tree. In fact, there's far more than one. Every branch is hanging with yellow ribbons, scores and scores of them. Your parents love you that much, they want you to come home."

If parents can love their wayward children like that, how much greater is the love of God! Truly, we are loved with everlasting love. have the church, which was built in around 1938 and stands on a one-acre site, listed on the borough's assets of community interest register.

This means that residents now have six months to try to raise the funds to purchase the site and keep it in community use. If the building can be secured, the group, which plans to register as a community interest company, hopes to run a community cafe on the site, as well as providing other activities such as a playground and a youth club.

A second group called 'Save Our St Peter's' has also been campaigning to stop the building being lost to the community and has distributed 2,000 cards door-to-door in the Westlands, started a petition and website and put up a huge banner to raise awareness.


They have also identified another church group which would be interested in buying St Peter's and who say that there are restrictive covenants on the land.

Westlands resident Wayne Huby, of Save Our St Peter's, said: "The land was originally sold by the council to the Methodist Church for a reduced rate with this covenant - which says the only buildings allowed on the land are the church, the Sunday School and a house for a minister or caretaker."

Simon Tagg, Westlands ward councillor and borough council leader, said: "I am backing the community in their attempt to secure a community use of the old Church and hall, and support the bid for asset of community interest status which has been successful."



LIBRARY - The former Newcastle library (Above) in the Ironmarket is to be turned into housing, after plans were approved.

Built in the 1970s as a department store, the site housed the town's library until it moved to Castle House. It has remained vacant since and was bought by Drayon Beaumont Group LTD in 2020.

Newcastle-under-Lyme Borough Councillors agreed the plans to convert the site to 36 apartments with underground car parking,

The plans, which involve the partial demolition of the building, also include commercial space on the ground floor.

The firm has previously converted other buildings in the area, including the former police station. Councillors were in agreement that it would be positive for the building to be occupied again.

MOVING MEAT - Retailer Wayne Walker Quality Meats, on Hassell Street, has shut its town centre butchers - to trade from a mobile van instead.

A notice in the shop states: "To all our customers, we will be closing our shop in the next month. But don't worry we will be trading from our mobile shop on a Wednesday and a Friday in Newcastle with all the same products and much more so please look out for us. We thank you for your continued support."

TRENTHAM LODGES -The Booming Trentham Estate is once again considering building woodland lodges - 16 years after similar plans never got off the ground.

The attraction is currently surveying visitors about possible 'new experiences' at the estate.

Its questions include 'how likely' a member would be to book 'woodland lodges for short breaks or longer holidays'. The survey then asks the same question around 'eco-sensitive lodges with a spa'.

It comes 16 years after plans to build 75 lodges in a £6 million scheme were first unveiled. The two and three-bedroom lodges were planned in woodland near the monkey forest and the lake in a Center Parcs-style development. Its masterplan - dating back to 2000 - included woodland lodges, a budget hotel and a five-star hotel. But the woodland lodges plan - approved by Stafford Borough Council in 2012 - never happened and the planning permission expired. The five-star hotel was also never built.

TAVERN CLOSURE - The Westbury Tavern, in Westbury Park, closed suddenly late last month and its blinds have now been pulled down. But owners Greene King say the closure is only temporary and it is set to reopen.

The Westbury Tavern had a strong reputation for its food and also had no televisions or loud music.

A spokesperson for the Westbury Tavern said: "We can confirm that the pub is only temporarily closed and we look forward to re-opening the Westbury Tavern to the community soon."

THISTLEBERRY SALON - An engaged couple have poured their marriage savings into opening a new salon after their wedding was cancelled due to the pandemic. Tara Parfitt, aged 29, and 30-year-old Jamie Howes, from Newcastle were planning a destination wedding in Cyprus when it was called off. Jamie then encouraged Tara to spend their £6,000 on beauty courses, and the two launched their salon, *Beauty and the Barber*, in Thistleberry Avenue.

Tara offers a number of treatments, including regular brows, lashes, and nails, but also plasma fibroblasting, radio frequency, breast enhancement, laser lipo, and LED light therapy. The couple are now getting married in Cyprus this July.

WOLLEN DOUGHNUTS - Plans are underway to transform the former Edinburgh Wollen Mill shop on Newcastle High Street into a Chopstix noodle bar and bakery - Planet Doughnut. It will sell 60 flavours of doughnut and will be the firms first outlet in North Staffordshire. It has applied for the opening hours of 9 am until 11 pm and will create 6 full-time jobs and 10 part-time jobs.
