Our Rector writes.....

The Year of Evangelism Happy New Year!

Afew months ago, the PCC met for an Away Day led by Revd Steve Haskett from Blackburn Diocese. Steve said that many churches are struggling, because volunteers who have been helping keep the church running are getting older and don't have the energy to keep it up. The sad thing is that there's no one else to take their place. (Does this ring any bells for people at St Giles and St Thomas?). How did this happen? It used to be the case that people naturally came to church. Then it became the case that though people didn't naturally come to church, they knew the basics of what Christianity is all about. But now, people don't even know those basics. This means that we need to rethink how to go about things.

Steve said that there are four stages needed for someone to get to the point where they are in roles of authority in the church: a) enquirer, b) disciple, c) deacon, and d) apostle. Enquirers are those people who are interested in Christianity. Disciples are those who are learning more about what Christianity is all about. Deacons are those who have started to volunteer their time to help out (like being a sidesperson. welcomer, choir member, reading the Bible in church, or on the tea and coffee rota). Apostles are those who take positions of authority in church life, such as being wardens, treasurers, or PCC members. To grow and to make sure people are handing on their roles to others willing to take their place, churches need to be responsive to each of these stages. And at St Giles with St Thomas, we're really good at three out of the four stages. We have lots of events to welcome people to, such as the Friday Coffee Shop, the Wednesday Fellowship, quizzes and other fun events. This is great for enquirers. We're always trying to get new people on board to be deacons, serving the church. And so far, we've always had people stepping up to become wardens, treasurers, or PCC members.

However, there was one key stage which Steve noted was lacking at St Giles with St Thomas: stage c), disciples. Now, if this were a 'production line', this would be problematic. We are unable to get people from stage a) (enquirers), to stage c) (deacons). This means that after a while, the 'supply chain' is going to dry up. It won't be long until we won't have people stepping up to do even small deacon-roles, let alone the stage d) apostle-roles.

In response to this, the PCC have agreed to start an 'enquirers course'. This is a course which introduces those people who would like to 'enquire' a little more into what Christianity is about in a non-threatening, open, and friendly way. The material we'll be using is called 'Hope Explored.' It lasts just three weeks. It gives people an entrance way into learning more about Christianity (there's a longer follow-up course called 'Christianity Explored). People will learn the basic tenants to the Christian faith, giving them an entrance into church-life. Steve recommends doing a course like this three times a year.

This is the point at which you may be thinking, 'Oh that's nice. I'm sure the Rector will do a good job!' To which Steve says, 'No. This can't be something which the Rector does. This has to be something that the church does.' In short, we need teams of people to do this. If this isn't owned by the congregation, it won't work. If it's just the Rector doing this, it won't work. And if it doesn't work, good luck trying to hand on your voluntary church role to someone else in five years' time... The point is that because it's owned and led by the congregation this is the kind of course that can still continue even if the Rector gets sick, gets run over by a bus, or wins £160 million on the eurolottery and flies off to Barbados.

This is the year that St Giles with St Thomas will begin to put a bigger emphasis on evangelism – that is, inviting people to meet with Jesus, to trust him, and to become part of his family the church, thereby taking people from being stage a) enquirers to stage c) deacons. And to do that, I need your help. We need a group of people who are willing to spend time looking at how we can evangelise (remember this is not about welcoming people, but teaching them about the basics of the faith). We need other people who are willing to lead the Hope Explored course (believe me, it's not difficult – as long as you know how to press a 'play' button to a video and then ask, 'So what do people think of that', then you'll be fine!). But above all, we need people to come to these courses. Not so much

you church members who've learnt this stuff all your life. No, I want you to invite people to it! Friends of yours who've always been interested in learning about Christianity but don't want to make a firm commitment just yet. Friends who are 'spiritual but not religious'. Family members who wonder why you go to church and would like to understand it a bit more.

We have three dates in the diary for the first third of the year: Thursday 2nd, 8th, and 16th February at 6pm in the church. Jesus commanded us to go out into all the world and make disciples of all nations. This is an opportunity to start a bit closer to home. Please prayerfully think how you can be a part of this.

Leaving the year to chance is an invitation to the enemy to do with you as he likes.

God says you should commit your ways to Him, trust also in Him and He will bring it to pass - Psalm 37:5. It is great wisdom to commit the year into the hands of God in prayer so that He will bring it to pass. God, being the Alpha and the Omega, knows the end from the very beginning and so is in the best position to guide and direct you throughout the year, but not without your permission.

It is through prayer that you give God the permission to guide and direct you. And because it is for the whole year, it is very important that you set out some time to seek God's face concerning the year. And it's best when you couple your prayers with fasting. Fasting certainly doesn't change God but it does prepare you to hear and receive more clearly and accurately all that God

Christ and the apostles all needed to pray and fast; waiting on God before fully commencing their assignments. They did great exploits, the kind of success that is still speaking till today.

Into the New Year


The leaves are thick upon the ground,

Epiphany is also known as 'Twelfth Night', or the last night of the Christmas festival. According to the song, it is also the day when that over-enthusiastic 'true love' of yours dumps no less than 78 presents on your doorstep, among them a dozen leaping lords of the realm and a final partridge – to go with the 11 you have already been given.

In many parts of the world, 6th January is celebrated as Christmas Day. As we Western Christians are packing away our tree, the Greek Orthodox world and Catholic Spain are giving presents and celebrating the wise men, or magi. For what better time to give presents to each other, than on the day the wise men presented gold, frankincense and myrrh to the infant Jesus?

What do we make of these presents? Gold is for kingship, proclaiming a royal child. Frankincense carries a feeling of worship about it: It was used in the temple worship and indicated access to the presence of God. Frankincense is thus for worship and incarnation.

The third gift, myrrh, finds it place at Calvary. After the crucifixion, Nicodemus and Joseph of Arimathea prepared Jesus' body for burial, using myrrh as an embalming fluid. Thus, when the wise men visit the baby Jesus, the shadow of the cross already falls across the crib. But myrrh is also symbolic of love, so you could say that the third gift is about adoration as well as death. And Christ's death on the cross is for love of the Church, His bride.

As for the magi, they were not Jewish grandees, but foreign Gentiles. And so it was clear, from as early as the manger in Bethlehem, that Jesus was not just the Messiah for the Jews, but the Saviour of the whole world.

The Coming of the Magi Wordsearch

'Where is the One who has been born King of the Jews? We saw His star in the east and have come to worship Him.' So Matthew tells of the coming of the Magi, or Wise Men, to the baby Jesus. Today we remember it on Epiphany, on 6th January. Did they come from Arabia Felix – nowadays southern Arabia? How many came? No one knows, but by the 6th century they were named Gaspar, Melchior, and Balthasar. Why gold, frankincense and myrrh? Gold stands for kingship: Jesus was King of the Jews. Frankincense stands for divinity; Jesus was to be worshipped. Myrrh stands for death and burial; Jesus would become a sacrifice and die for His people. The Wise Men were the very first gentiles ever to worship Jesus. Isaiah foresaw this response to Jesus: 'Nations will come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn.' The Magi wanted to worship Jesus; Herod wanted to kill Him. But the Jewish leaders who knew about the prophecy of a Messiah born in Bethlehem did not even bother to visit to Bethlehem. And it is only six miles from Jerusalem!

Suggested plans for borough's 850th anniversary celebrations unveiled in December.

The Council and its partners are pulling out all the stops to organise a year-long events programme to help everyone celebrate a momentous milestone in Newcastle-under-Lyme's proud history.

This includes the creation of a new logo recreating

the borough crest, (see above), which will be used in all promotion, as well as a dedicated section of the Council's website which is now live.

Preparations are well underway to deliver an action-packed calendar of cultural and heritage activities throughout 2023 in honour of our loyal and ancient borough's 850th anniversary, with a view to involving community members in a series of exciting civic events which deliver a lasting legacy for the borough. Newcastle-under-Lyme was granted its first royal charter of incorporation in 1173 by King Henry II after a population grew around a "new castle" built by the Normans.

An engaging and inclusive anniversary programme is being developed by an "850 working group" in conjunction with partners, local businesses, councillors and sponsors. To date the Council has secured several sponsors for the campaign including Keele University, Aspire Housing, the Community Foundation, Staffordshire Chambers of Commerce, Options Management and local MP Aaron Bell.

They currently involve –

A celebration of famous and influential residents – past and present – at Brampton Museum involving exhibitions, film showings, talks, online content, displays in the Spotlight Gallery and a range of family-friendly activities. There will be a different theme each month –

January – Fascinating Folk
February – Newcastle People in the World

March - Business and Industry

April - Literature

May – Military

June – Big Celebration

July - Sports

August – Heroes of the Borough

September – Rights and Protests

October - Arts

November – Science and Engineering

December – Living Legends

A themed experience at Brampton Museum designed specifically for schoolchildren in addition to a medieval extravaganza at Brampton Park. A "Celebrate Newcastle" event at Brampton Park, in association with popular arts and cultural organisation Appetite, on 3 June followed by a medieval battle re-enactment of Blore Heath in September. Window displays and bunting in Newcastle town centre. A programme of educational activities for schools. In addition to one-off events, there are plans to deliver a lasting legacy through —

Proposals for a Lyme Forest containing 850 new lime trees on the former Keele golf course. A new printed book of the History of the Borough. A special subway mural at Queen's Gardens. Aspiration Keele - aspiring local students to study at Keele University. The creation of an annual Local Heroes Award ceremony to continue to focus on rising stars from the borough. A heritage blue plaque nomination scheme to acknowledge residents' contribution to society. The launch of an annual history lecture. A new statue of the late Queen Elizabeth II. Council Leader Simon Tagg said: "The 850 anniversary of Newcastle-under-Lyme in 2023 is a once in a generation opportunity to bring our communities together in appreciation of the fantastic history of our town while giving the local economy a real boost.

"The first royal charter, awarded in 1173, gave special rights and freedoms to residents that went on to help shape the borough as we know it. Perhaps most notably this included the right to hold an outdoor market, a longheld tradition that's still an important aspect of the town's vitality and success.

"Newcastle-under-Lyme is steeped in history and culture. We want to showcase all that's great about the borough, celebrating it with pride and passion, by providing a series of enjoyable events. There was a real buzz when the late Queen Elizabeth II visited the area during the octocentenary in 1973; we want to recreate that special atmosphere for an extended period of time while providing a real, lasting legacy."

There are various opportunities to be involved through volunteering, support in kind or by providing sponsorship. A total of £25,000 has been earmarked from the Council's Borough Growth Fund – money set aside to promote the town – and confirmed external funding currently amounts to £35,000.

◆TREE PLANTING - Hundreds of lime trees will be planted on land at the former Keele golf course in spring 2023 to celebrate the forthcoming 850th anniversary of Newcastle-under-Lyme.

It will be the latest phase of a long-term strategy to turn local green spaces into carbon capture woodlands for future generations.

On the agenda is an update on the Council's Urban Tree Planting Strategy, an ongoing project to boost the number of trees on urban sites across the borough which will contribute towards ambitious net carbon zero goals as part of its Sustainable Environment Strategy.

As well as plans for a commemorative Lyme Forest at Keele containing 850 lime trees – a nod to the ancient forests that gave Newcastle part of its name – in addition to other associated planting early next year to mark the borough's royal charter of incorporation in 1173, the initial part of phase four involves planting proposals for Clough Hall Park in Kidsgrove; Kennet Close, Westbury Park; Moreton Parade, May Bank and St. Edmund's Avenue in Wolstanton which are scheduled to be completed this winter following consultation with residents. Additional sites are set to be planted up with a range of native trees in early 2023.

Over the past two years, 265 trees have been

planted on eight sites, including Sandy Lane, Newcastle; Repton Drive, Westlands and Newchapel Recreation Ground. All sites will form part of an essential mosaic of local green spaces that will be protected for the benefit of nature recovery and carbon capture for the future. In time, further carbon reduction opportunities on these sites, with community involvement, will be considered.

Council Leader Simon Tagg said: "Trees not only enhance popular and much-loved green spaces; they're vital to our very existence as they're the ultimate carbon capture. The Urban Tree Planting Strategy is focusing on carrying out tree planting in the borough's urban wards as this is where carbon capture is most needed to mitigate the carbon footprint generated in built-up areas, both now and into the future. Ultimately, planting lots of new trees will help the Council on its journey to net carbon zero, in terms of removing carbon emissions from the atmosphere, as part of its Sustainable Environment Strategy which prioritises a sustainable future for the borough."

"We're also keen to involve local residents in the process of safeguarding urban green space and enhancing the local environment across the borough."

A community donation scheme is being set up via the Council's website which will allow residents and businesses to contribute towards future tree planting projects across Newcastle-under-Lyme.

◆VILLAGE AWARD - Belong Newcastle-under-Lyme care village has been recognised with a national award win commending the positive impact on participants' wellbeing, as well as the strategic creative approach to caring for those living with dementia. We Belong Together (WBT) was devised through Belong's partnership with Liverpool's contemporary arts centre, the Bluecoat to support customers residing at Belong care villages when government intervention placed them in lockdown, limiting social interaction. Critically acclaimed artists ran weekly virtual sessions with tenants, using a range of art forms, including ceramics, sound and storytelling.
